Local Care Farmer wins prestigious award



We are pleased to announce that Claire Moore was recently nominated for, and won, a British Farming Award. Claire was nominated in the 'Farm Worker of the Year' category and won the Silver award at a glamourous awards ceremony hosted by Vernon Kay at the National Conference Centre in Birmingham. More than 700 farmers and industry professionals attended the event, which celebrated the innovation and achievements of British farmers across the agricultural industry.

After a break from the industry following the dispersal of her family farm, Claire is now the agricultural lead across High Farm Social Care Farm, Botton run by the Camphill Village Trust. Spanning four farms and residential houses which offer supporting living for adults with learning disabilities, Claire oversees 300 acres of the farmland working with a suckler herd, pigs and turkeys. The bio-dynamic care farm specialises in utilising the land and animals as a way to support adults to gain work experience and therapy from working in a supportive environment, and Claire is responsible for helping to facilitate this delivery.

"I teach adults how to care for and look after livestock ensuring the highest safety and welfare for both the staff and livestock," says Claire, who has a background in social care. "I love my job and I pride myself in all that I do, making changes when needed to make sure the farms run efficiently utilising the grazing to maximise productivity."

Building wellbeing - A cultural prescription

Staff from Social Farms and Gardens and the Growing Care Farming project will be representing the sector on Thursday 28th November at a conference in York. 'Building Wellbeing - A Cultural Prescription' is designed to be both a celebration event and to highlight the range of work that museums are delivering and an opportunity to develop partnerships with key stakeholders. The day will involve a mix of updates and discussions which include practical examples of how culture contributes to wellbeing, why commissioners fund and where to go for funding, an understanding of the key people and agencies to connect with, a focus on green and blue prescriptions and social prescribing and creative health agendas more generally.

We hope to gain some insights which will help us promote the care farming sector further and will provide you with an update on any interesting learning and opportunities in the December/January bulletins.

Funding and Tender Opportunities

The CLA Charitable Trust

Grants for organisations in England and Wales to provide facilities for the disabled to take part in country sports and recreation, and training in agriculture and horticulture. It also promotes education in the countryside for disadvantaged children and young people.

To be eligible for funding, you must be either a registered charity or community interest company. Your organisation or project must fit within one or more of the three aims of the Trust and will be assessed against these by the Trustees.

The Trustees prioritise funding to smaller charities or projects where their contribution can make a significant difference.

Funding will not be given to organisations who:

- Are applying for staff costs, sensory gardens or community allotments;
- Are state funded schools or other institutions;
- · Have substantial financial resources;
- Have received a grant from the Charitable Trust in the past three years.

Projects which are based on horticultural activities must be able to demonstrate that they provide training which leads to a recognised, accredited qualification for the participants.

Pocket Parks

Thousands of people are set to benefit from new pocket parks or the revival of rundown green spaces as Communities Secretary Robert Jenrick launched a £1.35 million fund on 27 October 2019. Mr Jenrick opened bidding for the pocket parks programme, which helps support communities to transform unloved, neglected or derelict urban spaces into new green spaces. Community groups can now bid for new parks or reimagined spaces that will be used for everything from children's play areas, to vegetable patches and community events, benefiting the mental and physical health of people who use them.

Deadline: 5:00pm on 31 December 2019

Grants are available to charitable organisations in the UK for a wide range of projects in the areas of welfare, youth, community, arts, faith, environment, education, health and museums and heritage.

The Yapp Charitable Trust

Small grants to support the running costs of very small charities in England & Wales working with;

- Elderly people
- Children and young people aged 5-25
- People with physical impairments
- People with learning difficulties
- People with mental health challenges
- Poeple trying to overcome life-limiting problems of a social, rather than a medical, origin (such as addiction, relationship difficulties, abuse, offending, etc)
- Education and learning (with a particular interest in people who are educationally disadvantaged, whether adults or children).

The Postcode Community Trust announces Funding Round dates for 2020

The Postcode Community Trust focuses on initiatives that benefit communities through grass-roots sports, arts, recreation and wellbeing programmes which improve people's physical and mental health. Grants of £500 - £20,000 are available to registered charities. Grants of up to £2,000 are available to other not for profit organisations. There are two grant rounds per year and in 2020 Round 1, Stage 1 will be open between 21st January - 4th February 2020.

BBC Children in Need - Small Grants Programme

Grants for not-for-profit organisations that are working with disadvantaged children and young people who are 18 years or younger living in the UK, the Isle of Man or the Channel Islands. Grants of up to £10,000 are available per year for up to three years (£30,000 total request). In terms of deadlines the next two are; 2nd December 2019 with decisions made at the end of March 2020, or 16th March 2020 with decisions at the end of May 2020.

Applicants must refer to the A-Z guidance document before making an application.
