A snapshot of school farms autumn 2019

- All school farms provide opportunities for all pupils to gain experience of farm livestock, with varying proportions of the student population actively engaged in practical tasks
- Type of schools with farms: approximately 2% Preparatory, 27% primary/junior, 48% secondary, 7% both primary and secondary, and 15% are 'special needs'
- Some school farms are very old (1864) but new ones are being created each year, the majority being within primary schools: 5 in 2016, 6 in 2017, 5 in 2018 and 4 in 2019. Of these 11 are primary schools, 3 both primary & secondary, 4 secondary and 2 special needs
- The number of students from other educational settings using the school farm varies from pre-school visits, through practical sessions for other schools' courses, work experience, to childhood and education (and also veterinary) degree students
- The range of qualifications offered using the school farm is most commonly (2019-20) BTEC Levels 1 & 2 in Animal Care City & Guilds Land-based Studies GCSE, but other BTEC, ASDAN and AQA courses are also delivered
- The average size of a school farm is approximately 5.3 hectares, but with a median size of 1.81 hectares, and mode (most common) is 1.0 hectare.
